UPDATE ON A WAY FORWARD

Last month at Annual Conference, Rev. Tom Berlin spoke on Friday morning about A Way Forward and the three plans put forward by the Commission to the Counsel of Bishops. I found it informative, clearly presented, and thought provoking. The information that follows is from his presentation.

The final report of the Commission on a Way Forward will be published on or about July 7th, 2018. It may be a few days before or after, as it is being translated into four languages and they will all be released at the same time. July 7th will also be the last date for other petitions to be submitted.

The Council of Bishops will meet November 4-9, 2018

A Special Session of the General Conference will meet February 23-26, 2019 in St. Louis, Missouri. Here the decision will be made on how we will move forward.

The Commission put forward three plans as a result of their work. They are: The One Church Plan, Connectional Conference Plan, and the Traditional Church Plan.

ONE CHURCH PLAN

- *Removes the restrictive language from our current Book of Discipline
- *Does not require any annual conference, bishop, congregation, or pastor to act contrary to their convictions.
- *Allows congregations and pastors greater freedom to reach new people.
- *Recognizes the diverse theological and scriptural understandings of our global church.
- *Provides generous unity for conferences, churches, and pastors.
- *Maintains the current structure of the denomination.

CONNECTIONAL CONFERENCE PLAN

- *Creates three values-based connectional conferences: accountability, contextualization, and justice. (Related to same sex marriage)
 - *Accountability- no one can
 - *Contextualization- all can, no one must; some will, some won't
 - *Justice- all shall
- *Current central conferences have the choice of becoming their own connectional conference.
- *Council of Bishops is focused on shared learning and ecumenical relationships.
- *Episcopal oversite, accountability, elections, assignments, and funding occur with the College of Bishops of each connectional conference.
- *Jurisdictional Conferences choose their connectional conference.
- *Local churches who desire to join a branch that is different from their annual conference could vote to join another annual conference.

TRADITIONAL CHURCH PLAN

- *Strengthens the current language of the *Book of Discipline* concerning human sexuality for greater clarity.
- *Streamlines the process to enforce penalties for violations of the *Book of Discipline* related to marriage and ordination of self-avowed practicing homosexual persons.
- *Maintains the current structure of the church.
- *Continues the current relationships between the church and all general agencies and commissions.

Something to think about: WHO WILL THE UMC BE?

- *In what form of faith community?
- *With what unity?
- *Seeking to do ministry with whom?

The Council of Bishops has voted by an overwhelming majority to share the work done by the Commission on a Way Forward on the three plans and to recommend the One Church Plan.

It is important that we come together in prayer to support our leaders and delegates as they continue to discuss the important questions of inclusivity in the United Methodist Church as a Body.



I know we're still in the middle of summer, but September will be here before you know it. With September comes the end of the 3rd quarter and our annual meeting which will be held this year on September 22 at Sterling United Methodist Church.

Please get your 3rd quarter contributions in to me no later than September 15 so that I can send them to the Conference on time. I also need your Rainbow Giver forms and Candle Burning information by August 31, so we can recognize our 5- and 6-star units at our annual meeting.

To be recognized as a 5-star unit, you must give to the 5 channels of Mission Giving which are: Pledge to Mission, Gift to Mission, Gift in Memory, Special Mission Recognition, and World Thank Offering. Once you have met the requirements for a 5-star unit, you can become a 6-star unit by also contributing through Candle Burning. The cost per second for Candle Burning is \$.60. An easy way to become a 5-star unit is to have at least one Rainbow Giver. Being a Rainbow Giver qualifies your unit as a 5-star unit. Rainbow Giver forms are included in this publication.

For the units that have contributed so far, I have listed the number of channels to which you have contributed. So far this year, only Clarendon UMW has met the requirements of a 5-star unit (and, yes, they have a Rainbow Giver.)

News from the Social Action Desk

Social Action concerns are running wild in our community, our state and our nation. There are so many issues it was hard to select what I consider to be the most important. I've selected two that the United Methodist Women focus on - healthcare and families.

Medicaid Expansion in Virginia

The following information is from a blog entry by Sen. Creigh Deeds. Sen. Deeds represents the 25th Senate District.

On Wednesday, May 30, 2018, the Virginia General Assembly adopted a budget two and half months late. The budget expands access to healthcare through Medicaid to roughly 300,000 low income Virginians. For over five years advocacy groups and some legislators have been fighting to reach this goal. The accomplishment is significant in many ways.

The nuts and bolts of Medicaid expansion are relatively simple. Virginia will have to submit waiver requests to get approval for our plan. The effective date is January 1, 2019. Medicaid will be available to those who earn up to 138 percent of the federal poverty level. This covers people who make too much to qualify for Medicaid now but cannot afford their monthly premiums for an employer based plan or do not make enough to qualify for subsidies on the federal health insurance marketplace. The plan includes co-pays as well as premiums for this coverage based on a sliding scale not to exceed two percent of income. Able-bodied adults will be required to work, look for work, or participate in job training or education programs. The inclusion of these provisions was essential to passage of Medicaid expansion. The impact is also limited because 75 percent of the Medicaid expansion population either works full time or lives with someone that does. The work requirement is waived in areas of high unemployment (150 percent of the statewide average).

This is great news for Virginians, especially for middle- and low-income residents. It has taken 5 years to get to this point. Many social justice groups have been instrumental in getting this passed. Way to go Virginia General Assembly for getting this important and necessary benefit into law!

Here is the UMW's Official Statement on the immigration policies and actions currently in place on the US/Mexico border –

Families Belong Together, Indefinite Detention Unacceptable UPDATED

(from UMW National Website) Updated: 6/21/2018



Families belong together.

The Administration's June 20 decision to stem the horrendous policy of separating children from their parents as their families seek refuge at the United States border reflects the outcry of people across the nation. However, it does not guarantee the reunification of children already taken from their families, and it offers an unacceptable alternative of indefinite family detention.

United Methodist Women stands in our objection to the zero-tolerance policy that criminalizes families seeking asylum in our nation.

The United Methodist Church Social Principles affirm that "we oppose immigration policies that separate family members from each other or that include detention of families with children ... " (Social Principles 162.H). The UN Convention on the Rights of the Child states that detaining a child on the basis of their, or their parents' migration status is a child rights violation.

United Methodist Women urges the Administration to act immediately to reunite the 2,300 children separated from their parents under its zero-tolerance policy and to publicly verify the reunification of these families.

We affirm current U.S. law under the "Flores" decision, which protects the welfare of immigrant children by limiting child detention to 3-5 days, or a maximum of 20 days in the "least restrictive" setting appropriate to their age and needs. We reject the June 20 Executive Order's proposal for action to suspend the "Flores" decision, as this would open the door to indefinite family detention.

These families have a legal right to apply for asylum, and this must be enforced. They should not be returned to situations of violence and potential death. They must be released with their families intact and have legal support to pursue this application process. This is an area where the faith community can play an important role, when we have access to support families. Together, we must guarantee them a fair chance to remain in the U.S. safely, permanently, in regular status.

We continue to be vigilant in our commitment to a just immigration policy. Proposed legislation that would build walls, spend billions more on enforcement, eliminate family visas and further criminalize migrants is not an acceptable trade-off to end family separation or family detention.

We are grateful to God for the people of good will around the country who publicly voiced their dismay at family separation policy. We call on them to continue to use their powerful voices until every child is with their parent outside of detention, and until we have a humane and just immigration policy.


